This poster depicts the Australian Hospital Ship (AHS) *Centaur* being attacked by the Japanese off the coast of Queensland, during the Second World War. In the water below the ship are a number of nurses and sailors from the ship. The sinking of the *Centaur* took place on 14 May 1943 and 268 lives were lost, including 11 out of 12 nurses. This year marks the 50th anniversary of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War coming to an end. We remember Australia's participation in the Vietnam War in this issue of *Salute* with two feature articles relating to the Vietnam War. On page 34 you will find "The Cherry Tree Walk Vietnam War Memorial". This article was written by TPI NSW member and Vietnam Veteran Tony Blake who has been involved with the Cherry Tree Walk Vietnam War Memorial project in Bowral since 1996.

This issue also contains a profile of TPI NSW member Kevin Thurgar who held the rank of sergeant during the Vietnam War and worked as a photographer and cinematographer with the Royal Australian Army Educational Corp (Public Relations). Both before and after Kevin's service in Vietnam he was also a cameraman working on television and movie news programs in Sydney. In Vietnam, Kevin was stationed from late 1967 to late 1968 at the First Australian Task Force (1ATF) Base in Núi Đất. During this time, he served with both the 1st and 7th Royal Australian Regiments (1RAR and 7RAR). Vietnam War Commemorative Medallion and Certificate

To acknowledge the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, the Department of Veterans' Affairs will produce a Commemorative Medallion and Certificate of Commemoration.

The medallion and certificate will be made available to every living veteran, widows of veterans and other family members of veterans of the Vietnam War. Please note that only one medallion is available per Vietnam War veteran. While Australia can never repay the debt we owe to the 60,000 who served in Vietnam, this medallion and certificate are a small but meaningful way to honour their service and to recognise the sacrifice of those who never returned home.

The obverse design will feature the Commonwealth Coat of Arms with "Vietnam War" inscribed at the top and "Australia remembers" at the bottom. The medallion reverse design will feature words of thanks at the bottom with the years 1962-73 inscribed at the top to represent the years in which Australia was involved in the Vietnam War. The medallion also features a UH-1 Iroquois "Huey" Helicopter, a depiction of HMAS Sydney (III), the "Vũng Tàu Ferry", and an Australian solider holding an SLR.

The medallion will be presented in a display case and will include a card that explains the design and contains a brief expression of thanks.

The design of the commemorative certificate will complement the medallion. The design

includes the Commonwealth Coat of Arms, "Australia Remembers" wording and includes the signature of both the governor-general and the prime minister.

The certificate will be contained within its own folder that will allow for independent display, framing and mounting.

On 20 April 2023 Australian War Widows NSW and the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway commemorated Australian service personnel, through the AWWNSW 71st Remembrance commemoration service.

TPI NSW Director Ron O'Connor, JP, represented the Association at the service. AWWNSW CEO Renee Wilson said of the service, at St Andrews Cathedral in Sydney, "It was the usual high standard. It was moving. It was thought-provoking. It was special. It was about the families of our veterans – thank you to my incredible team, many of whom are the families of veterans themselves, for continuing to deliver for our widows and veteran families." Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway Anzac Day Service

On Saturday 22 April 2023 NSW TPI Association Senior Vice President Kevin Kelly represented the Association at the annual Anzac Day service at the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway in Concord, Sydney. Among attendees were Kokoda veteran Reg Chard, several international dignitaries and representatives of partner RSL sub-branches.

Music was provided by the NSW Corrective Services Band and the Strathfield North Public School Choir, who performed the New Zealand national anthem in Maori. The Requiem was delivered by NSW Veterans Minister, the Hon David Harris, MP. The guest speaker was Lt Col Garth Callender, author of After the Blast: An Australian Officer in Iraq and Afghanistan. After the Blast recounts Callender's service – during which he was severely injured – and healing. After recovering from the physical injuries caused by the blast he returned to Iraq, where he had to contend with suicide bombers, missile attacks and the death by misadventure of Private Jake Kovco. Callender is today active in the Army Reserve.

President's Report

April 2023

By the time you are reading this report Easter has come and gone, as has the opportunity to provide feedback/ask questions on the new constitution and indeed the Special General Meeting to formally vote on the draft constitution. It is hoped the outcome will be of benefit to the Association going forward.

I hope you marked ANZAC Day in a manner befitting the occasion and managed to renew friendships developed during your time in the ADF. Senior Vice President Kevin Kelly laid a wreath on behalf of the Association at the RSL and Schools Anzac Memorial at the Anzac Memorial, Hyde Park on 3 April 2023.

I represented TPI NSW at the Federation
Congress held in Canberra during March. DVA
Minister Matt Keogh attended, as did DVA Secretary
Alison Frame and her entourage. Minister Keogh
advised that the Government was focused on
legislative reform pertaining to simplifying claims
processing, delivering their election promises
along with managing cost overruns in relation to
the NDIS and Defence commitments entered into
since assuming Government. It is unlikely that
our TPI Campaign will gain any ground during
the Government's first term in office. Ms Frame
did indicate she would investigate improvements
within the existing Hearing Aid funding and
provide an update.

The Government's proposed reforms to Veterans' Entitlement Legislation have the potential to affect veterans. The vast majority of our members are covered by the Veterans' Entitlement Act (VEA). However, since 2004 younger veterans have been covered by other Acts, and generally receive lump sum payouts rather than pensions. Having multiple Acts covering veterans leads to complications in accessing entitlements. The Royal Commission into Veteran Suicides has found that delays in claims processing have adverse impacts on veterans' mental health.

The Government is committed to creating a simpler, easier to use system. They have established a Veterans Legislation Reform Consultancy. The Government's goal is to create a new single ongoing Act, with existing claims remaining, under grandparented provisions of earlier Acts.

The impact of the proposed changes on the veteran community is the potential to lose or have entitlements reduced. The veteran community must remain vigilant and ensure that entitlements gained are maintained.

The TPI NSW Association Strategic Plan is being implemented within the time frame previously announced and some of the resultant changes are already apparent.

I look forward to catching up with fellow members in person at our meetings and the Christmas-in-July luncheon. Until then stay safe and keep well.

BALLOT FOR THE ADOPTION OF A NEW CONSTITUTION

Arrangements were made for me to conduct a ballot of eligible members of the Association to determine whether the new Constitution for the Association should be adopted. Voting was conducted online but members also had the opportunity to vote by post if required. Voting was open from 24 April to 18 May 2023 during which time a total of 172 members voted online and a further 20 members voted by post, bringing the total number of votes submitted to 192. These votes were subsequently tallied and resulted as follows:-

Andrew Wilkie, MP

Joined the Directors in a Conference Room as arranged. Andrew expressed an opinion that the new Government were focused on their election promises, the economy, the NDIS and Defence commitments made since taking office. He couldn't see any interest in the Federation's Campaign for at least 12 months. He offered an opinion on the the DVA Minister.

Andrew has now experienced firsthand the issues surrounding hearing aids and will do all he can to persuade the DVA Minister to resolve the

situation. His previous attempts, through Senate Estimates, had no impact.

Senator Ross Caddell had been double booked by his PA and will meet with Federation President McCabe at a later date,

Senator David Shoebridge was on duty at APM. He extended an apology.

Returning to the Congress venue and following lunch the Directors gathered in the Meeting Room, where *The Ode* was delivered by President Pat McCabe, OAM.

Welcome

The Directors and Observer were welcomed to the meeting.

DVA Secretary Ms Alison Frame accompanied by Don Spinks, AM, Repatriation Commissioner; Stuart Smith AO DFC, Defence Engagement Commissioner; Kate Pope, Deputy President DVA; Brian Eastman, Executive Director Audit and Risk Management and Policy; Liane Pettit, Chief of Staff/Parliamentary and Governance.

Ms Frame gave her background leading to her appointment and provided details of the Legislation Reform Pathway to consolidate three (four) Acts into one. The draft is due at the end of December 2023 with the new legislation due one year later.

Stuart Smith gave details of the 50th anniversary

of the end of the Vietnam War commemoration. This involves the points they are focused upon, a community awareness campaign; establishing a documentary series through the ABC; the issue of medallions and certificates plus a commemoration service at the National War Memorial.

Mr. Smith gave an update on the Claims backlog, down below 30,000 split into Initial Liability and Permanent Impairment.

Kate Pope provided an update on recruitment and training. Additional staff appointed –365 from 90. delegates to 490. Processing claims firstly by Screening Team then Claims Support Team for presentation to the delegates. They have a faster link to Defence through Information Technology. They review their resource model daily and monthly by the minister.

The group were quizzed on many topics including tinnitus treatment and hearing aids. Secretary Frame has taken on the hearing aids

issue, firstly within the present funding.

Scott Jeffery (Observer SA) spoke of SRDP, if veterans take the Invalidity Pension with reference to the Douglas Decision and Lump Sum Income Support incurring "Offsetting".

The lack of Medical Services accepting the Gold Card, appears to be a big ACT issue but is a growing concern particularly in regional areas.

Call centre wait times. The Secretary advised a new system is being rolled out.

President McCabe raised the complications surrounding Authority to Represent, where separate applications are required for ATO, Centrelink. Aged Care and DV.

The topic of cannabis oil. Advised to refer to the chief health officer for authority to supply.

The new exhibits in the AWM, Frontier Wars and Vietnam War Protesters, were discussed. Advised to write to the Director Matt Anderson.

National Consultative Forum President McCabe

suggested the departments involved (Centrelink and ATO) be included; currently they know nothing about DVA issues.

The 12-week Treatment Cycle, the majority rejected the Cycle. Kate Pope was asked why it continues. Kate will investigate. Practice Management coordinated with Veteran Care. To be advised.

The DVA Group were thanked for making themselves available before they departed.

Afternoon Tea

3.30 pm

On resumption the President asked what we wanted to achieve.

Bob Moore (Victoria) suggested we need to have younger veterans involved to keep an eye on the proposed changes, with the draft legislation due at end December 2023

The subject was debated until close of day at 3:47pm.

The Directors were welcomed, dependent on the Budget taking time (??). It is vital we stay on the ball with the new Legislation. The new Microsoft App designed for instant communication now installed.

The DVA secretary cancelled all meetings, just resuming now.

Directors were shocked to learn Federation membership has dropped from a 2007 total of 14,242 down to 6,661 in 2022.

DVA Minister

Matt Keogh joined the Congress accompanied by his PA. He thanked the Federation for the opportunity to address and the important work Federation does for veterans.

The Government is concentrating on delivering election commitments and are aware that more than the \$1,000 was required for TPIs.

DVA is rolling out 10 new Veteran HUBS and staffing them, ensuring the staff have the knowledge required.

Mental health is a joint Defence and DVA issue.

500 Staff appointed to DVA to deal with claims which have increased but being turned around and they hope to have the backlog removed early next year.

They have removed staff caps and provide protection to Royal Commission witnesses.

DVA have addressed 15 of the recommendations out of the Royal Commission.

The pathway to legislative reform involves grandfathering VEA and SRCA. Eventually MCRA will be the only path in about a year or so.

Pat McCabe asked about War Widows currently granted a Gold Card automatically upon death of veteran partner under VEA. What about under MCRA? Minister assured her it will remain so.

Pat McCabe asked about DRRB offsetting which is legal but immoral. The minister argued her premise is based on false information.

The GP issue regarding Gold Card acceptance by providers. The minister said it was symptomatic of ACT but is a broader problem and is a WIP.

The Minister departed at 3:45pm but several questions were passed on to his PA who assured the Directors his office would provide responses shortly.

lan Swan (SA) was asked to do a presentation on the Therapy Dogs program, which was most informative and embraced the program right through from the D9 365 Request for Assistance Dog application form (0822). After a seven-year campaign DVA will pay all costs if a veteran has an authorized dog from any source. They can apply to have DVA take over.

General Business

TPI VIC: Bob Moore expressed concern over AWM failure to acknowledge veterans that pass away after their service from service-related injury/ illness. He was advised the rules have changed regarding plaques and it was suggested Bob make a submission to AWM through the Federation.

TPI SA: Brett Grosser introduced discussion on the content of Federation meeting minutes arguing only a summary is necessary. It was agreed a summary would be provided on the Federation website, however the full detailed minutes would still be produced for the Directors.

TPI QLD: George Robinson asked after the Federation business card template. Directors were asked to indicate their need for these cards.

TPI Federation President: Discussed the RSL lack of support to the TPI Federation.

TPI TAS: Provided a comment on the 10% given to TPIs, the Action List reviewed every 6 months and other issues.

Observer SA: raised the future of TPI Association.

The TPI Federation thanks DVA Minister, Matt Keogh, MP, Andrew Wilkie, MP, DVA Secretary, Ms Alison Frame and her staff for attending the recent TPI Federation Congress in Canberra in the week ending 17 March 2023. Again Mr Wilkie has given great support to the TPI Federation and will continue to do so. Unfortunately, other MPs and Senators were unable to attend. The individual State/Territory Directors will provide a synopsis of the events of the Congress.

DVA Secretary, Ms Alison Frame

The TPI Federation met with the new Secretary on 16 February 2023 and again at the March National Congress.

Ms Frame was very generous with her time and even though she was only in the position since 23 January 2023 she was extremely knowledgeable on most of the DVA issues. The Secretary was asked to "take ownership "of the Veteran Hearing Aid issue that has been prosecuted unsuccessfully for the past nine years. The Secretary confirmed that she would be assessing all the information available and will advise when the full situation was known by her.

The TPI Federation again is able to ask all TPIs/ SRs that if you have any ongoing hearing aid issues if you can advise on the contact details at the end of this report so that we can hopefully update the current lack of benefits in this area.

Totally and Permanently Incapacitated Payments Increase

The last report noted that following the long running TPI Federation campaign for the rightful adjustment to the TPI Economic Loss Compensation Payment, the small but necessary adjustment of \$1,000 per annum (or \$38.46 per fortnight) to the annual rate of the 'Totally and Permanently Incapacitated' (TPI) Payment commences from 1 January 2023. This was enhanced by the usual indexation increase of \$59.04 per fortnight from 20 March 2023.

The TPI Federation will continue to advocate for a proper increase to the TPI Economic Loss Compensation payment. When the campaign began the Economic Loss Compensation was 65% of the tax-adjusted minimum wage. When the Labor Party was elected in May 2022 it was 61.9%. This was followed by an increase to the minimum wage in July 2022 as well as the election promise in January 2023. This bought the figure back to 65% of the tax-adjusted minimum wage. The TPI Economic Loss Compensation is now again 65% of the tax-adjusted minimum wage as it was in 2013. Again, the Government is supporting an increase to the

minimum wage at the next Fair Work Commission Annual Wage Review hearing of 7% from 1 July 2023. This would then only widen the gap yet again for the TPI Economic Loss Compensation.

50th Anniversary of the Proclamation to End Australia's Involvement in the Vietnam War

The link www.dva.gov.au/vietnam50 will direct you to the National Mailing and Marketing website. National Mailing and Marketing have been engaged by the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) to coordinate the production and distribution of the commemorative medallions and certificates for the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War. You will note that this website displays the DVA logo and the Vietnam50 logo, along with the National Mailing and Marketing logo.

In order to apply for a medallion and certificate, veterans and their families will need to follow the prompts on this website to set up a New User account.

Anyone encountering difficulties with this process is encouraged to call 1800 VETERAN (1800 838 372) between 9am and 5pm AEST, Monday to Friday, and when prompted say the word medallions. A member of the commemorations team will then assist them with the application process.

Unfortunately, we do not have any printed forms. Should any applicants not have Internet access they are able to call 1800 VETERAN between 9am and 5pm AEST, Monday to Friday, and when prompted say the word medallions. We have plenty of staff on hand who can lodge the form on behalf of the applicant.

Royal Commission Update

The Royal Commission into Defence and Veterans Suicide will be holding hearings in Perth from 16 May 2023. The interim report was provided by the Commissioners on 11 August 2022. The final report is due to be tabled on 17 June 2024.

DFA Report Highlights Opportunities for Defence Family Career Comeback Programs

The Department of Defence has advised the following: "We are pleased to share that Defence Families of Australia's evaluation report of the pilot Defence Family Career Comeback Course (CCC) is now public and available on the DFA website.

This report provides a blueprint for industry, educational institutions and governments to take our learnings from the program, improve on it and independently run this or similar programs nationally.

DFA developed the pilot Defence Family CCC in partnership with the Australian Graduate School of Management (AGSM) at the University of New South Wales (UNSW) Sydney.

The pilot program aimed to support Defence and veteran families in ACT and NSW in returning to work after time away from the workforce or their preferred career path.

Defence family employment is an important area of focus for DFA's advocacy work.

Defence families give much of themselves in supporting their serving member's military service. This often comes at a cost for their own career advancement through postings and breaks for caring responsibilities.

We know from the 2019 ADF Family Survey that even though Defence partners are more likely to be tertiary qualified than the general public, they are twice as likely to be unemployed.

The pilot Defence Family CCC program was run in November 2022 and sponsored by the Department of Defence and in kind support from the NSW Government and UNSW.


A total of 19 participants attended the three-





The story of the *Montevideo Maru* has attracted international attention since the wreck of this Japanese WWII "hell ship" was discovered just a week before Anzac Day 2023. On 1 July 1942 the *Montevideo Maru* became the first of around 17 Japanese hell ships sunk by Allied forces between 1942 and 1945. The wreck of the *Montevideo Maru* was discovered at a depth greater than that of the *Titanic*. The discovery was made by Sydney's Silentworld Foundation and a Dutch company

specialising in deep-sea surveys, with support from the *Montevideo Maru* Society and the Australian Department of Defence. The wreck site, 110 km northwest of Luzon in the Philippines, will be used for research purposes. However, no human remains or artefacts will be removed out of respect for the families of those onboard who were lost in the tragedy.

The Montevideo Maru was taking POWs from Rabaul to Hainan Island, when it was sunk by torpedo fire from the Allied submarine USS Sturgeon. The sinking resulted in the loss of all POWs onboard, numbering approximately 1060.

The prisoners who died in the sinking of this ship included at least 850 Australian and possibly some New Zealand service members, as well as 210 civilians from 14 different countries. More Australians died in the *Montevideo Maru* sinking than were lost in the entire Vietnam War, the sinking of HMAS Sydney (645) in 1941, or the sinking of the Australian hospital ship Centaur (268) in 1943. Silentworld director John Mullen describes the sinking of the Montevideo Maru as "a terrible chapter in Australian military and maritime history. Families waited years for news of their missing loved ones, before learning of the tragic outcome of the sinking. Some never fully came to accept that their loved ones were among the victims." Yet, as with the sinking during WWII by "friendly fire" of the many other Japanese hell ships, the story of the *Montevideo Maru* is arguably not enshrined in Australia's collective consciousness in a similar way to other Australian military losses.


About Porky's People

This book tells the history of the Seventh Battalion Royal Australian Regiment (7RAR) during its first tour in South Vietnam. The book primarily uses images to tell this story, whether they be photographs, artwork, maps, or newspaper cuttings. As the title of the book states, it is about Porky's People and the priority for selection of images has been the people who served in or supported the battalion.

The book is set out generally in chronological order so that the reader can easily follow the sequence of events. The scope of the book covers the period from the raising of the battalion through to the time it returned to Australia and the immediate aftermath.

Each operation has its own chapter with an accompanying map. A short introduction to each operation is provided – sufficient for the reader to understand what the operation was about and the key events. For some operations there are a large number of photographs, and these chapters are necessarily much longer than other operations that have few, if any, photographs.

Newspaper articles have been selected on the basis that they directly describe 7RAR activities or people, or they provide relevant background information.

The Cherry Tree Walk Vietnam War Memorial

The year was 1996. I was living in the Southern Highlands of NSW, some 20 years after the end of the Vietnam War. I had served in Vietnam as an infantry soldier with 7 Royal Australian Regiment (RAR) in 1970 and '71. A local newspaper story caught my eye – a proposal to establish a Vietnam War Memorial on the Southern Highlands of NSW. Immediately caught by the concept I reasoned perhaps they could use the assistance of a Vietnam Veteran? After writing to the Wingecarribee Shire

Council I received a letter which appointed me formally to the Bowral Garden Committee.

The garden committee already had a project under its belt, that of Settlers Park. This was an area in front of the Bowral Swimming pool, planted with selected trees. The proposed memorial walkway would make use of then unused land that started next to the swimming pool. It would run for four kilometres next to the Mittagong Rivulet, crossing several streets to end at Old South Road in East Bowral. Trees would be planted on either side of a cycle/walking track with rest areas.

The tree chosen for the memorial walk was the eastern great white cherry, Prunus Tai-Haku. Remarkably, the great white cherry tree had been a neglected species, nearly becoming extinct. Fortunately, around 1900, one great white cherry tree was sent from Japan to a garden in London, England. In 1923 the tree was near death, when an expert on Japanese flowering cherries spotted the tree in this London garden. Thousands of trees have since been propagated from this specimen, leading to the reintroduction of the great white cherry tree into Japan, and the distribution of this tree worldwide.

To state the memorial's presence and assist the process of raising funds, the garden committee was formally closed and a new committee called the Vietnam War Memorial Trust was established. I continued as a member of the new memorial trust. The trust was led and driven by a passionate lady called Mrs Effie Kerr, who in later years was awarded the OAM for her work on behalf of veterans. The treasurer of the trust was Mr Darrell Chadwick. Legal work for the project was carried out by Mr Garry Barnsley.

Importantly, architect Mr Kevin Gallagher produced plans for a unique monument as part of the memorial concept. The design proposed for the Cherry Tree Walk Memorial was to avoid a single built monument in favour of a series of parkland amenities, each having a commemorative aspect, so that collectively the amenities became the memorial. Included in the plan was also a monument containing the names of Australia's 521 Vietnam War dead.1

The concept of the monument was taken from

timeless landform imagery – a circle, a sacred grove of trees, a ring of monoliths, the earthen mound. Thus, the result is a ring of four polished black granite monoliths obliquely grouped around a grassy knoll on which stands a fifth upright, the dedication monolith, set withing a semicircle of cherry trees. The whole grouping, four cherry trees and monoliths, is set in a circular flower bed, forming a permanent wreath. The whole grouping is backed by a screen of Australian casuarina trees.

The first three years of arranging the memorial went by at a frantic pace, during which funds were raised and the word was spread throughout the veteran and ex-service communities. The actual building of the monument with the five monoliths was by a local, Mr Peter Genner, and his employees along with nine Vietnam veterans – Grahame Tooth, Doug Blatch, Billy Clack, Dennis Mulquiney, Billy Lamb, Roy Elbourne, Bruce Boffinger, David Babbage and Rodney Smith.

Building a Vietnam War memorial with a stunning monument and planting hundreds

of cherry trees next to a rivulet, only 20 years since the end of the War. What could go wrong? Unfortunately, not everyone is respectful of those who served in that War and from time to time some crawled from under their rock to oppose the concept.

The first difficulty, right at the start of the project, was triggered by a young girl. The rivulet had to be cleared of huge weeds, those being willow trees. Once the local paper made this public, the outcry was almost immediate, led by a young girl complaining about the loss of those "beautiful" weeds. This was followed up by putting front page images of the young lass pointing at the willow trees. However, the council could see the benefit of the clean-up of the rivulet and, more importantly, the removal of weeds would be at no cost to the ratepayers. The work soon started to remove the weeds from the rivulet. Hard work, it must be said, undertaken by male prisoners from the local Berrima jail.

The first official event on site, the dedication of

the first four trees, took place on 9 May 1996 with the then mayor of the shire and three Vietnam veterans, being members of 1RAR, 4RAR and 1 Field Regiment. This was the real start of the Cherry Tree Walk.

Fast forward to the dedication on 22 August once the monument was complete in 1999, as close to Vietnam Veteran's Day as possible. The day was chosen as it was a Sunday, allowing working veterans to attend. Veterans and family came from all over Australia. To start the service the veterans carried out the first ever march from the Bowral township onto the walk area for the formal program.

The guest list was impressive, with the guest of honour being then Chief of the Defence Force Admiral Chris Barrie, OA. Grahame Tooth and Doug Blatch were recognized by teaming with Admiral Barrie at the parade, service and dedication of this original build of the memorial. Also present were legends of the RAR – Brigadier Colin Khan DSO the former CO of 5RAR, and Warrant Officer (WO) Class One Wally Thompson, OAM, who served with a number of battalions including 4RAR and was

appointed to the position of RSM-Army in 1983. The main monolith features the words, "They Served Their Country With Honour" and the "Red Rat", which is actually a red kangaroo – a symbol painted on all military equipment belonging to Australia during the Vietnam War. The monolith was covered from view with a camouflage net when the parade from Bowral arrived at the monument site. At the start of dedicating the Cherry Tree Walk, Admiral Barrie, Mr Tooth and Mr Blatch freed the rope holding the camouflage net to reveal the memorial's main monolith.

The event was a major success, and it was not over. Many had booked for the luncheon held at the Mittagong RSL, enjoying the concert by the Band of the Royal Military College while others enjoyed the BBQ on site provided by the local National Service Association.

The War Memorial Trust and veterans breathed a sigh of relief, being extremely pleased with the dedication and spurred on to take the memorial forward. While donations arrived to buy more trees which were eventually moved on site and planted, actions by unknown persons targeted the

trees and the walk on different occasions, leading to damage of many trees so badly that they had to be replaced, costing more money. Thankfully, tree vandalism declined towards the end of the 1990s. The memorial is now maintained by the local branch of the Vietnam Veterans Association and the tree management team of the Wingecarribee Shire Council.

The Years 1999 to 2004

In early 2000 the monoliths suffered from issues affecting the glue used to hold the panels in place, which "bled" and then streaked onto the names of the Fallen. This was unacceptable and the committee worked to rebuild each monolith with new granite panels from South Africa and eight new name plates with 521 names of the Fallen. [Editor's Note: Different sources state different numbers for Australians killed in the Vietnam War, although all sources give numbers close to 521.]

In 2004 the trust staged a dedication parade and service at the memorial. Once again, the veteran community responded and attended in force. One very important visitor who attended the 2004 dedication was WO Keith Payne VC, AM accompanied by his wife.

Documenting Vietnam

TPI NSW member Kevin Thurgar held the rank of sergeant during the Vietnam War and worked as a photographer and cinematographer with the Royal Australian Army Educational Corp (Public Relations). Both before and after Kevin's service in Vietnam he was also a cameraman working on television and movie news programs in Sydney. In Vietnam, Kevin was stationed from late 1967 to late 1968 at the First Australian Task Force (1ATF) Base in Núi Đất. During this time, he served with both the

1st and 7th Royal Australian Regiments (1RAR and 7RAR). In 1975 he returned to Vietnam as a member of the press covering the aftermath of the Vietnam War.

Over his time based at Núi Đất, Kevin was sent out with both 1RAR and 7RAR to document a variety of military operations. Some of the images included with this article show Kevin's skilful use of the camera when he was sent out on these operations. It is worth reflecting on the fact that Kevin was working not only under the pressure of being in a war zone, but also at a time when instant review of the images he was making was not

available as it would be today. After shooting a film in the field, Kevin would generally hand the film to whoever he could find to get it back as quickly as possible to Headquarters to be developed. Sometimes there was not the capacity to develop films at Army Headquarters, so films would be developed by local Vietnamese.

Originally from Rozelle and Drummoyne in Sydney, Kevin recalls that he experienced interactions with a wider variety of people in Vietnam than he had previously experienced in Australia. And Kevin also remembers being afraid that he could be killed any second.

One incident that stands out in Kevin's mind is being injured when he was sent out on a boat that capsized. He was accompanying a group of infantrymen and engineers travelling on the Australian landing ship medium (LSM) *Harry Chauvel*. Kevin wrote to his family that he and other soldiers got off the LSM *Harry Chauvel* into a smaller boat to do a "recce" of a beach. Although the outboard motor of Kevin's smaller boat had been tested and found to work while travelling on LSM *Harry Chauvel*, once Kevin and the others were in the smaller boat the motor wouldn't start. Kevin wrote:

All of a sudden, we were swamped. There were guys going in all directions as the boat overturned. I went down and my combat gear and cine camera kept me under, so I let the camera go. I started for the surface swallowing water and I just got to the top in time. There were blokes swimming for the overturned boat and guys just coming up. I got to the overturned boat and held on with one hand and grabbed a bloke with the other hand and pulled him to the boat, and then I grabbed


another guy and got him to the boat ... One guy was caught up in some ropes, and as the waves crashed down on us the boat would go down and so did he. We thought he was done for. My boss and another guy finally cut him free, but he had a broken leg ... We got our combat gear off and gave it to some blokes in a rubber life raft. They got the guy with the broken leg to the beach and sent him to hospital by helicopter.

Kevin's left knee was hurt during this incident, and he later needed a knee replacement as a result. But Kevin was still able to continue documenting Australian military activities in Vietnam.

One of several operations that
Kevin documented was the Battle of
Coral-Balmoral, part of Operation Toan
Thang 1 (Complete Victory 1), which
occurred in mid-1968. Operation Toan
Thang 1 involved 1ATF, along with the
US Army, the Army of the Republic
of Vietnam (ARVN) and the Royal
Thai Volunteer Regiment. These units
defended Saigon and the Bien Hoa/
Long Binh military complexes as the
North Vietnamese enemy launched
a general offensive to coincide
with preliminary 1968 Paris Peace

Talks. Kevin has recently received an Australian Department of Defence Unit Citation for Gallantry with Star to honour "extraordinary gallantry in action in the Binh Duong/Bien Hoa Provinces of South Vietnam from 12 May 1968 to 6 June 1968 during Operation Toan Thang".

Kevin also recalls the traumatic experience of encountering orphaned children whose parents had been killed by the Vietcong. Throughout the War large numbers of children were orphaned, and by the end of the conflict orphanages throughout

South Vietnam were filled with children. Kevin took many photographs of orphaned children during his service in Vietnam. The newspaper item "A Nicer Side of War", reproduced here, shows Kevin helping Vietnamese children to look through the viewfinder of his movie camera.

The Australian War Memorial holds almost 400 photographic and movie items created by Kevin – far too many to be listed in this article. But among notable events documented by Kevin during the Vietnam War is a visit to Australian troops in



Kevin returned from Vietnam in 1968. But in 1975, while working for a TV station, he returned to Vietnam for a short time to document the aftermath of the War. Following this, Kevin continued to work in Sydney as a news cameraman. But returning to "Civvy Street" presented challenges and Kevin was drawn to having a quieter life. Some years ago, Kevin retired to a house on a large block of land in the more peaceful location of Cessnock. Today he enjoys the company of congenial neighbours, with loyal and affectionate Sammy the dog by his side.

What supporting documents do I need for my scholarship application?


It is advisable to start preparing your documents before applications open as this can take a considerable amount of time. You can find more information at avcat.org.au.

80th Anniversary of the Sinking of AHS *Centaur*


Eighty years ago today, Australian Hospital Ship (AHS) *Centaur* was sunk by a Japanese submarine off the coast of Queensland. When *Centaur* departed Sydney on 12 May 1943, there were more than 300 people on board – sadly only 64 survived the sinking.

Minister for Veterans' Affairs Matt Keogh said this attack resulted in the nation's worst loss of life from

an enemy submarine attack during the Second World War. "The sinking of AHS Centaur was an unspeakable attack on an unarmed ship working to assist those injured during the war, and today we pause and pay tribute to all those who were on board at the time of the attack," Minister Keogh said. The explosion was so large and unexpected, it took just three minutes for her to sink and the crew had no time to send an SOS message. The survivors used anything they could find to make rafts out of debris. They then waited for up to 35 agonising hours before being rescued.

Sister Ellen Savage was the only one of twelve nurses to survive the sinking. Even though she suffered major injuries herself, she concealed them to focus on treating the wounded and keeping their spirits up until they were finally rescued. "Sister Savage showed great heroism in the hours after the

sinking of *Centaur*. Her bravery in the face of such adversity resulted in her being awarded the George Medal," Minister Keogh said.

On Sunday 14 May The Australian War Memorial hosted members of the 2/3 AHS *Centaur* Association at the Last Post Ceremony, where the story of Field Ambulance medic Private Clement Edward Lynne was told. The Memorial's *Centaur* collection features personal watches, flares, lifejacket lights and medical equipment salvaged by the survivors.

Keep Your Heart Healthy This Heart Week

2 May 2023

Each year Heart Week encourages us to have important conversations about heart health. It is also a good reminder that we all need to take action to care for our hearts. After all, we only have one and it has a very important job to do.

Your heart is a vital organ (actually it is a muscle) that pumps blood all-around your body, carrying oxygen and nourishment that you need to be healthy.



The system that transports blood around our bodies is known as the circulatory system and it is made up of blood vessels including arteries and veins. Sometimes our arteries and veins can become stiff and/or develop plaque which makes it hard for blood to flow freely through our heart and around our body. If this happens our heart needs to pump harder, which might raise our blood pressure and/or heart rate. Over time, restricted blood flow to your heart can cause heart disease and/or lead to a heart episode.

It's important to note, a heart episode can include angina, a heart attack or a cardiac arrest that happens suddenly. A heart episode is not always related to heart disease.

Risk Factors

There is no one thing that causes heart disease but there are risk factors that contribute to your chances of developing heart disease or experiencing a heart episode. Some risk factors are non-modifiable, meaning you can't do anything to change them. Non modifiable risk factors include

things such as gender, age, race or family history. Other risk factors however are modifiable, meaning these are things you can change. Modifiable risk factors include things like having high blood pressure, high cholesterol, or being overweight. The best way to reduce your modifiable risk is to make healthy lifestyle choices.

There are positive steps we can all take to help make our hearts healthier and stronger, regardless of our age or gender. Even if you have heart disease or have suffered a heart condition in the past, it's not too late to make positive lifestyle changes. Positive changes included not smoking, limiting alcohol and eating a balanced diet, while incorporating exercise into your daily routine. It is recommended that you speak to your doctor or a health professional before commencing an exercise regime if you have pre-existing health issues or are new to exercise.

Get Support to Keep Your Heart Healthy

As you get older your risk for heart disease or suffering a heart episode increases. You can

reduce this risk by getting regular check-ups with your GP to determine your level of risk. DVA provides eligible veterans with one off or annual health checks. The Veterans' Health Check is a comprehensive health assessment done by your GP. It provides an opportunity to access early intervention care and appropriate referrals when needed. More information about the Veteran Health Check, including eligibility, can be found on the DVA website.

Heart disease is a long-term chronic condition that impacts your heart and circulatory system and is associated with the build-up of plaque and clogging of your arteries. DVA offers access to ongoing care for eligible veteran Gold Card holders with heart disease through the <u>Coordinated</u> <u>Veterans' Care program</u>.

DVA also provides eligible veterans access to participate in the <u>Heart Health Program</u>, which has been beating strong for the past 23 years. The Heart Health Program is a free, year-long, national program that helps veterans to prevent heart disease or a heart episode by incorporating health education, exercise and balanced nutrition into their daily lives.

Putting Names to Our Unknown World War 1 Legends

On Anzac Day, in the Somme region of France, locals join Australians to remember the Aussie Diggers who fought to save their towns in the Great War.

This year is especially significant because five

soldiers who have been missing since the Battle of Fromelles, more than 106 years ago, have now been formally identified.

There is no question the Battle of Fromelles was one of the worst days in Australia's military history. It is the site of the greatest loss of life Australia's armed forces ever suffered in a 24-hour period.

In the early evening of 19 July 1916, elements of the 5th Australian Division, along with the

soldiers of the British 61st, were preparing to attack the German lines at Fromelles. They were among the first Australians on the Western Front. Many were veterans of Gallipoli. Others were new reinforcements. We can only imagine the advice or wry jokes the old hands must have exchanged with the fresh faces as they readied to go over the top. As they rose above the parapet and moved into no man's land, they met a resolute German resistance.

The Germans had a clear view of the assault, and quickly unleashed a terrible hail of fire and shrapnel. The attack was a catastrophic failure. The losses were devastating. The 5th Australian Division suffered more than 5,500 casualties.

They were ordinary Australians who had answered their nation's call and yet the final resting place of many remained unknown. Families never knew where they lay, nor if they had received a proper burial. For thousands of families, this was a tragically common story. It is a story of how pain and loss continued to echo down, long after the guns had ceased to fire.

This Anzac Day, we return the names to five of these brave soldiers. Corporal William John Stephen, from the 55th Battalion AIF, was born in Balmain and worked as a grocer when he enlisted in Liverpool in July 1915. Corporal Stephen was 28 years old when he was killed in action. Private Richard James McGuarr, from the 32nd Battalion AIF, was born in Lismore and was a dairy farmer when he enlisted in October 1915. Private McGuarr was 27 years old when he was killed in action. We now know the final resting place of these young men from NSW, along with Sergeant Oscar Eric Baumann from South Australia, Western Australia's Private Alexander Russell Robert Page and Private Maurice James Claxton.

We were only able to identify these soldiers thanks to the brilliant work of volunteers and Defence personnel. They performed rigorous research and analysis to identify these men. The remains of these five soldiers were recovered, along with 250 of their fallen comrades, from a mass grave near Pheasant Wood in 2009. In 2010 they were reinterred at the newly created Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery as Unknown Soldiers.

It was an honour to visit the resting places of these brave men and, on behalf of the Australian government, pay tribute to their sacrifice. They gave their lives in the service of our nation, just as 46,000 other Australians did on the Western Front.

commemorates their sacrifice and is the site where we hold the Anzac Day Dawn Service in France. At Villers-Bretonneux 10,800 names are commemorated on the Australian National Memorial. It is difficult today to fathom the scale of loss those 10,800 names represent. And yet it is a fraction of the more than 60,000 Australians who were killed in service during WWI when so many families across our nation were touched by tragedy.

On Anzac Day, we remember them. We remember them all. We honour their service and their sacrifice. Lest we forget.

Saltwater Veterans – Getting Veterans Sailing

17 April 2023

We are committed to creating a highly inclusive community that alleviates social isolation for veterans and families through the sport of sailing.

Originally known as "Four Men in a Boat",
Scott and three veteran friends with no sailing
experience took to the waters to reconnect with life
and each other. Following an 18-year naval career,
Scott found the camaraderie, the movement and
the sheer enjoyment of being out on the water had
immediate benefits for each veteran's physical and
mental health. Inspired by the effects on Scott's
wellbeing, Scott and Jen started volunteering,
encouraging more veterans to get involved in
sailing.

Based on the Northern Beaches of Sydney, Saltwater Veterans has been operating since 2017. With a crew of "salty volunteers", yacht clubs and sponsors such as Young Veterans and more recently local RSL sub-branches, we are now fostering overlapping communities in Sydney, Newcastle, Adelaide, Nowra, Perth and Mooloolaba, and upwards of 80 – 100 veterans each month on water.

Being on the water can be of physical, mental, and emotional benefit for a variety of injuries and illnesses. Plus, it's a really fun way for our veterans to express teamwork – one of many things veterans have in spades.

"When you have a participant turn up, it's amazing the change from the beginning of the day to the end of the day," says Tom Spithill, Saltwater Veterans Sailing Project Sports Ambassador.

The Saltwater Veterans Sailing Project organises one event in each location every month. The biggest single event had 105 current serving soldiers sailing, with 20 boats largely skippered by volunteers.

"We are volunteer-dependent and we see volunteering as an integral part of the veteran

experience," says Scott. "You may start as a participant at the sailing events, but with time everyone has the capacity to volunteer whether it's on the boat, handing out life jackets or taking the lunch order."

"Our aim is social re-integration, so we want to keep people involved and connected in-between and beyond the events," says Jen. "I feel the volunteers take away as much as the participants because, as a volunteer, it's not about what'I' want to achieve, it's about what 'they' want to achieve. People recognise the gift of giving to the community beyond themselves."

Funding is a constant challenge for any grassroots initiative. Local organisations can make a large-scale impact where it matters most, in the backyard where the majority of veterans live and socialise. Through its Community Support Advisors and Health and Wellbeing funding, DVA has provided small, one-off funding towards Saltwater Veterans local initiatives, and equipment purchases.

External Defibrillators

The DVA's Wellbeing funding has meant we've been

able to buy five Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs). These will be a tremendous asset in supporting Saltwater Veterans projects in Sydney, Jervis Bay, Adelaide, Newcastle and recently Port Macquarie.

"To have the support of DVA and a little funding for our own safety equipment will have a significant impact on our mission," says Jen. "Our AEDs will serve veterans, and other grassroots veteran groups during their activities."

In the water below the ship are a number of nurses and sailors from the ship. The sinking of the *Centaur* took place on 14 May 1943 and 268 lives were lost, including 11 out of 12 nurses. After the ship was torpedoed it sank in just three minutes.
